The <u>Network of Major Sites of Vauban</u> (*Réseau Vauban*) and the <u>European Federation of Fortified Sites</u> (EFFORTS) are pleased to invite you to an online session dedicated to exploring how fortified sites across Europe are responding to climate change — and to discuss the development of a European Platform for Technical Cooperation on this issue.

Context

In 2024, extreme weather events underscored the growing vulnerability of our fortified heritage. Heavy rainfall in the Alps led to the collapse of walls in Mont-Dauphin; in Saint-Vaast-la-Hougue, sea defences struggle against rising tides; and in Neuf-Brisach, alternating rain and drought disrupt both conservation efforts and everyday life. Yet modern fortified sites also offer solutions: ramparts and glacis help regulate temperatures and support biodiversity, while historic buildings present opportunities for sustainable urban renewal.

As Europe's built heritage faces increasing pressure from climate change, preservation efforts can no longer focus solely on monuments. They must anticipate environmental impacts and embrace interdisciplinary, holistic approaches — often with limited resources.



In this context, European modern fortifications stand as testament to the engineering brilliance of their time. Designed to adapt to diverse territorial contexts, they reveal a deep understanding of environments, resources, and populations. Among Europe's most renowned military engineers, Sébastien Le Prestre de Vauban (1633-1707) remains an emblematic figure. Inscribed on the UNESCO World Heritage list for their Outstanding Universal Value (OUV), the "Fortifications of Vauban" hold a major place in the history of military architecture. Today, these sites — having evolved beyond their original defensive roles — continue to shape the development of cities and serve as living spaces, sometimes even as reservoirs of nature. In the face of unprecedented challenges, these sites must once again innovate, bridging nature and culture to ensure their future resilience.

About the Session

This first informal online exchange will bring together managers of European World Heritage (WH) fortified sites (and those on national Tentative Lists). Together, we will:

- Share experiences from around Europe;
- Reflect on the potential of modern fortifications as "frontline" observatories for climate-related transformations;
- Start a conversation about creating a European Platform for Technical Cooperation between fortified sites.

Objectives

- Bring together site managers (municipalities and professionals) to:
 - o Identify common challenges, needs, and dynamics among participating sites;
 - Reflect on opportunities for integrating climate issues into fortified heritage management;
 - o Highlight the links between fortifications, territories, and urban landscapes;
 - Discuss the responsibilities and opportunities linked to WH in the context of climate change.
- Discuss the responsibilities and opportunities linked to World Heritage designation in the context of climate change.
- Strengthen the sense of unity and collaboration between site managers.
- Lay the foundations for partnerships around the role of fortifications in climate monitoring and adaptation.
- Advocate for the creation of a dedicated European Platform for Technical Cooperation.
- Share insights and outcomes with national and European authorities involved in heritage-related projects and policies.
- Build the capacities of fortified sites in Europe, notably through the EFFORTS network.
